

Introduction

The Malcolm Toye Scholarship Award is given to a youth sailor that exemplifies high standards in scholastic performance, seamanship, and athletic endeavors. This award is named in honor of Malcolm Toye, a long time resident of Santa Barbara, an avid seaman and racing skipper. This scholarship recognizes the young skippers commitment and enthusiasm and seeks to encourage continued efforts. The award includes a \$1000 grant to be applied toward ongoing sailing pursuits. This award is made possible by a generous gift by Delores Toye in honor of her late husband.

Period

This gift was first awarded in 2016 and will be retired in 2035.

Eligibility

- Be a returning high school student with a minimum GPA of 3.5
- Actively engaged in and representing the SBYSF race program for prior 12 months

Criteria

- Demonstrated seamanship and regular participation in SBYSF and related sailing activities
- Significant participation in regional, national and/or international regattas
- Application details of current and planned competition

Application

The annual announcement and applications will be made available in the June timeframe. This provides time for preparation of application and selection process prior to the annual awards dinner. Application will cover eligibility requirements as well as questions covering sailor's qualifications and achievements.

Announcement and Award

The recipient will be announced at the annual SBYSF Awards Dinner.

The recipient will receive a cash award of \$1000 to be used to pursue their sailing interests.

Selection

A committee established the SBYSF Board of Directors will review applications and select the award recipient. The submitted application will be the sole source for selection purposes. Responses to application questions will be evaluated against listed eligibility and criteria listed above. Selection committee members shall not be interested parties.

Malcolm was born February 2, 1927, in London, England to Herbert Toye and Stella Brown.

In WWII, at age 16 Malcolm joined the British Merchant Marine. Their mission was to bring American supplies to England across the Atlantic while German UBoats hunted the convoys. The submarines were sinking these supply ships by the thousands.

In 1952, he and his first wife, Pamela, came to the US and eventually to Santa Barbara, where his outstanding seamanship skills were quickly recognized by Hastings Harcourt. He became his racing skipper on a succession of Whistle Wing yachts that he campaigned internationally. He sailed in the Caribbean aboard the Marlabree with Peter Weaver doing charter work. Malcolm's last assignment was skipper for the late Dave Nancarrow's yacht, Summertime, from which he retired in 1991.

Malcolm is survived, by his second wife, Dolores, and in the UK, his brother, Raymond, Aunt Vera, grand nieces (Lisa (Kevin) Jones and Paula (Denis) Oates.
