## SAILING INSTRUCTIONS

The Organizing Authority for the 2022 Skiff Festival Regatta will be:  
The Santa Barbara Yacht Club (SBYC), 130 Harbor Way, Santa Barbara, CA 93109

**[DP]** denotes a rule for which the penalty is at the discretion of the Jury.

**[NP]** denotes that a breach of this rule will not be grounds for a protest by a boat.

**[SP]** denotes a rule for which a standard penalty may be applied by the race committee without a hearing

### 1. RULES

- 1.1 The event will be governed by the rules as defined in *The Racing Rules of Sailing* (RRS).
- 1.2 US Sailing prescriptions to rules 63.2, and 63.4 will not apply.
- 1.3 RRS 63.7 is replaced with: "If there is a conflict between a rule in the sailing instructions and one in the notice of race, the sailing instructions shall apply."

### 2. CHANGES TO SAILING INSTRUCTIONS

Any change to the sailing instructions will be posted before 1100 on the day it will take effect, except that any change to the schedule of races will be posted by 2000 on the day before it will take effect.

### 3. COMMUNICATIONS WITH COMPETITORS & COACHES

- 3.1 Notices to competitors and amendments to these Sailing Instructions will be posted on the online official notice board located at <https://sbyc.org/skiff-festival>.
- 3.2 The race office is located at the Santa Barbara Yacht Club - 130 Harbor Way, Santa Barbara, CA 93109, on the southwest corner of the building.

- 3.3 On the water, the race committee intends to communicate with competitors via megaphone.
- 3.4 The following communications may be made by the race committee:
  - Course number
  - Abandonment of one or more fleets
  - On course side boats or general recalls
- 3.5 Race Committee communication with coaches will be done via VHF radio channel 71.

### 4. SIGNALS MADE ASHORE

- 4.1 Signals made ashore will be announced verbally at the launch ramp to dinghy class competitors.
- 4.2 When flag AP is displayed ashore, '1 minute' is replaced with not less than 60 minutes in the race signal AP.

### 5. SCHEDULE

5.2 For all classes, a total of ten (10) races are scheduled with no more than six (6) races to be sailed on any one day.

## **6. CLASS FLAGS**

Class flags will be as follows:

## **7. RACING AREA**

The racing area will be in the Santa Barbara Channel within 1 nautical mile of the Santa Barbara Harbor entrance as shown in Attachment B – Racing Area.

## **8. THE COURSES**

- 8.1 The Diagrams in 'Attachment C – Course Chart' show the courses, including the approximate angles between legs, the order in which marks are to be passed, and the side on which each mark is to be left.  
8.2 No later than the warning signal, the race committee signal boat will display the course number on a large placard.

## **9. MARKS**

- 9.1 Turning marks will be inflatable shapes of colors consistent with those shown in 'Attachment C – Course Chart.'  
9.2 New marks as provided in instruction 11.1, will be:
  - A red inflatable mark to replace mark '1'.
  - A yellow inflatable mark with a black band to replace a gate mark.

## **10. THE START**

- 10.1 Races will be started by using Appendix U, rule U3 with the warning signal given three (3) minutes before the starting signal.  
10.2 The starting line will be between a staff displaying an orange flag on the race committee signal boat at the starboard end and the course side of the port-end starting mark.  
10.3 If when rule 30.1 or 30.2 is in effect any part of a boat's hull, crew, or equipment is on the course side of the starting line during the one minute before her starting signal and she is identified, the race committee will attempt to hail her sail number. Failure to make a hail or of a boat to see or hear her recall notification shall not relieve her of her obligation to start correctly and shall not be grounds for redress. A boat's position in the sequence of hailed numbers or broadcast numbers shall not be grounds for redress. This changes rule 62.1(a).

10.4 As a courtesy, the Race Committee will attempt to notify recalled boats by hailing their sail number. Failure of a boat to see or hear her recall notification shall not be grounds for redress. A boat's position in the sequence of hailed numbers or broadcast numbers shall not be grounds for redress. This changes rule 62.1 (a)

## 11. CHANGE OF THE NEXT LEG OF THE COURSE

To change the next leg of the course, the race committee will lay a new mark and remove the original mark as soon as practicable. When in a subsequent change a new mark is replaced, it will be replaced by an original mark.

## 12. THE FINISH

12.1 The finish will be between an orange flag flown from the race committee boat and a finish mark consistent with 'Attachment C – Course Chart'.

12.2 In the interest of starting another race in a timely fashion, the Race Committee may assign a finish position to the last finisher(s) in a class provided that the position(s) can be determined in a reasonable manner.

## 13. PENALTY SYSTEM

The penalty system shall be as described in Rule 44.1.

## 14. PROTESTS AND REQUESTS FOR REDRESS

14.1 Protest forms are available online at: <https://forms.gle/5ALuLBNsQHvRsohi6>. Protests and requests for redress or reopening shall be submitted online within the appropriate time limit.

14.2 The protest time limit is 30 minutes after the race committee signal boat arrives at the dock.

14.3 Notices will be posted on the virtual notice board no later than 30 minutes after the protest time limit to inform competitors of hearings in which they are parties or named as witnesses. This will constitute notification required by rule 63.2. Hearing locations will be announced on the online notice board and may be held online via zoom. Hearings will be heard in the approximate order as received.

14.4 Notices of protests by the race committee or protest committee will be posted to inform boats under rule 61.1(b).

14.5 Breaches of instructions marked **[NP]** will not be grounds for a protest by a boat. This changes rule 60.1(a). Penalties for these breaches may be less than disqualification if the protest committee so decides.

14.6 Penalties for breaches of instructions marked **[DP]**, are at the discretion of the Protest Committee. Penalties for these breaches may be less than disqualification if the protest committee so decides.

14.7 On the last scheduled day of racing a request for reopening a hearing shall be delivered

- a. within the protest time limit if the requesting party was informed of the decision on the previous day;
- b. no later than 30 minutes after the requesting party was informed of the decision on that day.

This changes rule 66.

14.8 On the last scheduled day of racing a request for redress from a protest committee decision shall be delivered no later than 30 minutes after the decision was posted. This changes rule 62.2.

## 15. SCORING

15.1 The low-point scoring system of Appendix A will apply except that when fewer than six races are completed, a boat's series score will be the total of her race scores.

15.2 Two races must be completed to constitute a series.

## 16. SAFETY

- 16.1 A boat that retires from a race shall notify the race committee as soon as possible. [NP][DP]
- 16.2 Competitors shall either wear a US Coast Guard-approved flotation device, or a flotation device that conforms to regulations of their own country. [DP]
- 16.3 It is the responsibility solely of the parent(s) of any competitor under the age of eighteen (18), or in the instance of the competitor who is eighteen (18) or over, the competitor, to decide if the competitor should sail in the weather and sea conditions that might arise during the event.
- 16.4 Parents of competitors under the age of eighteen (18) not personally attending any part of the event shall ensure that another adult is authorized and designated to make these decisions for their child.
- 16.5 The designated adult shall accept full responsibility for all actions of the competitor during any activity related to the event.

## 17. RADIO COMMUNICATION

Coach boats and spectators are asked to monitor VHF channel 71 for instructions from the race committee. The Race Committee will make announcements to the Viper fleet on VHF Channel 71.

## 18. REPLACEMENT OF CREW OR EQUIPMENT

Substitution of competitors will not be allowed without prior written approval of the race committee.

## 19. PRIZES

Trophies will be awarded to the top finishers in each class.

## 20. RISK STATEMENT

RRS 3 states: 'The responsibility for a boat's decision to participate in a race or to continue to race is hers alone.' By participating in this event each competitor agrees and acknowledges that sailing is a potentially dangerous activity with inherent risks. These risks include strong winds and rough seas, sudden changes in weather, failure of equipment, boat handling errors, poor seamanship by other boats, loss of balance on an unstable platform, and fatigue resulting in increased risk of injury. **Inherent in the sport of sailing is the risk of permanent, catastrophic injury or death by drowning, trauma, hypothermia or other causes.**
